SCHOLARSHIP FUND VOLUNTEER OPPORTUNITY ANITA IRANI, SCHOLARSHIP FUND CHAIR

The Scholarship Fund Committee meets once every month, except during the summer when meetings are held either in July or in August. Meetings are held virtually.

Members on the Scholarship Fund Committee serve for a period of three years. Each member will serve as secretary in their first year, treasurer in their second year on the committee, and will take on the role of chair in their third and final year. The Scholarship Committee disburses funds to twelve post-secondary institutions in British Columbia and each member is assigned four institutions/programs as their responsibility. Committee members communicate with their assigned institutions, ensuring that the funds are received through the Vancity Community Foundation, and monitor the funds disbursed through the institution. We also have the opportunity to communicate with award recipients if contact information for the students is sent to the committee, and we report on recipients through the monthly BCCGC newsletter.

The chair of the committee also attends approximately nine BCCGC executive virtual meetings held during the year. The committee presents semi-annual reports at the fall and spring meetings, held in April and October respectively at the Bonsor Recreation Complex in Burnaby. We also arrange for student award recipients from graduate programs to present research at these meetings, as well as arrange for a diverse range of vendors to be present at the meetings.

Other tasks include record keeping and liaising with the Vancity Community Foundation.

This volunteer opportunity is extremely rewarding as the members are able to liaise with, and sometimes meet student award recipients. As indicated on our website, we support twelve programs, including ones at UBC, SFU, University of the Fraser Valley, Thompson Rivers University, and more. Our student award recipients are enrolled in a diverse range of courses including horticulture, viticulture, pest management, forest and ecology management, and more. The mandate of the Scholarship Fund Committee is to manage the fund and also grow the fund and expand our scholarship program. We hope to support a new program — the Richmond Farm School (Kwantlen Polytechnic University) — this year.

As our chair completes her third year a position on the committee will become available in April 2025.

HOW TO KEEP RABBITS OUT OF YOUR GARDEN LIGHTLY ADAPTED WITH PERMISSION FROM GARDEN DESIGN

As we plan for adding edibles to our gardens (or adding pollinator plants to our community edible gardens) — as per the Community in Blooms theme of 2025, edible gardens — I recommend subscribing to <u>www.gardendesign.com</u>, where you will find all kinds of information on growing gardens.

Rabbits (and other wildlife) can wreak havoc in your garden, as it supplies a veritable feast and sometimes a lovely spot to create a nest.

Justine Guidry, *Garden Design*, wrote an article on some ways to keep the 'wascally wabbits' out of your garden.

Add physical barriers. Keeping in mind that rabbits can hop over some fencing and tunnel under fencing, you need to ensure that your fencing is at least 6 inches below ground level. Many gardeners choose chicken wire. It is wise to check the fencing from time to time to see if there are any holes. Guidry suggests installing motion-activated sprinklers as another way to deter them.

Include plants that rabbits do not like. Some suggestions include sweet alyssum, lantana, salvia, milkweed, spirea, catmint, sunflower.

Remove potential nesting spots. Rabbits love to nest in overgrown grassy areas. One year I was working in a garden bed and stepped into a hole filled with baby bunnies! A female rabbit can have more than 10 babies in a litter.

Add visual deterrents. Some suggestions were adding metal pinwheels, rubber snakes, and owl statues. Running twine between two stakes with strips of aluminium foil tied to the twine may also be a

deterrent. It is important to keep an eye on the garden to watch if other areas show signs of digging.

W Create your own spray. Cayenne pepper is not a favourite smell for rabbits. Give this recipe a try:

• Mix 2 tablespoons of cayenne pepper, 2 tablespoons of garlic, 1 teaspoon of pure castile liquid soap, and 5 cups of water. (If you have pets that love to roam your garden, ingesting too much cayenne pepper can irritate your pet's stomach.)

Richmond Garden Club is in the initial stages of preparing for our plant sale Saturday, May 3, 2025.

We sent copies of that article around to our plant sale team to look at some of their activitties to prepare for their sale.

As the article mentioned, they had almost 600 customers waiting in a line to participate in the sale!

Some take-aways that we will implement is the early preparation. They encouraged their members to start seeds and plant up their own plants at home (this activity contributed approximately 1,000 plants

to the sale). They also have a propagation team who meets in March to pot up more than 1,000 plants dug up from members' gardens. Hostas and other perennials are so easy to divide and create more plants!

Hello 2025 and Happy New Year everyone!

The Castlegar Garden Club was formalized in 1996 but had its beginnings around kitchen tables five years earlier. Bob Switzer provided the original spark that got things going, as we understand.

We are located in the beautiful West Kootenay region of British Columbia in the Selkirk Mountains at the confluence of the Kootenay and Columbia Rivers. Our city has a population of approximately 8,400 people.

We are a small club of nearly 50 members living the dream as gardeners. All are welcome. Our garden club meets on the third Wednesday of every month year-round at 6 pm.

For nine months of the year, we meet indoors at the Castlegar Community Complex, and in summer (June through August) we meet outdoors in members' gardens .

Much to the delight of members, we frequently go on "road trips" visiting places of interest in our region.

At winter meetings we welcome guest speakers on a variety of topics. Beekeeping, pollinator gardens, native plants, growing dahlias, travelogues, and planning for vegetable gardens to mention a few.

For our community we have a number of activities. For fundraisers we host an annual Mother's Day plant sale, which is our most favourite time of the year. Last year for the first time members organized a popular hanging basket seminar. In mid June we volunteer with the BC Yukon Region of the Canadian Peony Society to promote peony growing in the Kootenays at their annual show.

On June 22 of this year we will be hosting our community garden tour. Often we partner with local artists for displays and chamber music. Our latest addition was our local quilt guild, which was well received. Most often we have eight to ten locations on the tour.

In April, July, and October we participate in the Adopt-A-Road program for Castlegar In Bloom, picking up litter on our designated route. This activity helps our community, builds community pride, and encourages camaraderie. Usually this group retires to a local coffee spot for a cuppa.

Our club supports the BCCGC scholarship program, which we feel is vital to those studying in horticulture. We give thanks to the members of the Scholarship Committee for their outstanding contributions to this much needed cause.

We continue to celebrate the vital roles that gardens and gardening play in our communities and in our lives.
